One of Our Greatest Strengths

Dear Church Family,

Many of you have no doubt read my letter from earlier this week in which I announced my departure to become the National Minister of Environmental Justice for the UCC. As I now reflect back on my eight years of ministry in our church, I would like to share with you what I see as one of our church's greatest strengths. When one thinks of what defines the Body of Christ, it is easy to first think of the common values that we hold: love, justice, peace, service, etc. However, this church has repeatedly demonstrated to me another defining characteristic and that is our collective wisdom. We could say that our common values represent the heart of our body, while our collective wisdom represents the head.

I have come to appreciate that our church has an incredibly big head, and I mean that in the best possible sense. During the past eight years, we have at times faced significant challenges. Our cracking skylight might come to mind. With each of these challenges, I had a reoccurring experience. When I at first considered the matter alone, I would feel overwhelmed. How are we ever going to fix that skylight?! After worship or in the hallway, a few of us would talk about the issue at hand and commiserate. I would still feel overwhelmed, but I would feel better. Then, we would have a meeting, and it would be at this gathering that the gift of collective wisdom would arrive. All sorts of ideas would fly through the air. Some would quickly plummet like a wingless bird while others would flap a little and soon begin to soar. Especially tricky issues might require more than one meeting, but eventually, we would get to a place where each of us would leave the meeting feeling like we were ready to conquer whatever lay before us. We will get that skylight fixed! And, we would do just that.

I hope this church feels proud of the extraordinarily large head on its shoulders. It has repeatedly bolstered my faith and given me inspiration. May it do the same for each of you!

Mission & Outreach June Special Offering

Friends of the Carpenter" is a faith-based Day Shelter that provides safety and a sense of purpose to members of our community. It began in 1998 as a vision of simple welcome and personal interaction between volunteers from the church and those in the community who are disadvantaged. Wood devotional items are made at the shelter, but the main product is relationships--helping the disadvantaged see themselves as people of worth.

The Friendship Center is located at 1600 W 20th Street in Vancouver. It is open from 9 am to 4 pm, Monday through Friday. Volunteers are always needed to provide welcome and to help with activities, staff the reception desk, lead devotions or singing, and more. The 2nd Chance Thrift Store, located at 3414 A NE 52nd Street (52nd & St. Johns Blvd.) in Vancouver needs volunteer workers, donations, and shoppers.

The ministry is growing. The number of hours clients spent at the Friendship Center increased 60% during the first quarter of 2015 compared to the first quarters of 2012-2014. You can learn more at

Honoring our Past, Securing Our Future

Phase III of our Capital Campaign came to an official, glorious end with the well-attended, well received and well-enjoyed Italian Dinner on May 31st. Special thanks to Joan Blair and Leslie Chapman and their team for making the dinner a most extraordinary and enjoyable event.

The campaign commitments have been extraordinary as well. Our original goal was to obtain pledges over the next three years (January 2015 – May, 2018) of \$300,000. As these pledges were paid, we expected to use \$183,000 of the collected funds to make mortgage payments over the next three years and accumulate \$117,000 to reduce our mortgage principal in 2018. To date, we have received pledges and donations of over \$204,000. Though this is just 2/3 of our goal, the impact of the campaign is greater.

As we initiated Phase III, many of your generously completed Phase II commitments and made additional pledges to Phase III. This eliminated a short-term cash-flow problem. Thanks to a generous cash donation of \$50,000 at the beginning of the campaign, we made a mortgage reduction payment in April of 2015 instead of June of 2018 maximizing the impact of that donation. That leaves us with \$154,000 of a needed \$168,000 for mortgage payments over the next three years.

This sum represents the pledges of 56 households within our church community and we expect there will be a few more over the coming weeks. Also, many of you have expressed a desire to consider additional contributions over the coming years. I believe we are on secure financial ground and thank you all for your generosity.
