A MYTH SO PROFOUND

"Why," asks modern myth-maker Madeline L' Engle, "are we so gullible when it comes to promises about floor waxes which are better than other floor waxes, or pain killers which will remove all our physical ills, or all the other false promises which are constantly being offered a credulous public, and yet are afraid of the myths which will give meaning to our lives?"

When you hear someone say "it's a myth" they usually mean that it's a made-up story. But in modern times it's becoming clearer that myths are an important part of the human experience – giving meaning, distilling big concepts into palatable information, and providing a way to pass wisdom from generation to generation. Myths are in fact the opposite of lies - truths so profound, so compelling and so universal that they can't even be described – we just have to tell stories about them.

I talked to someone this week who, having found out that Jesus may or may not have been born in Bethlehem, said she felt like she'd been duped her whole life. I didn't want to break it to her that December 25 is probably not the actual birthday of Jesus either. Most likely, this date was chosen because it fell close to winter solstice, or to a Roman holiday celebrating the sun.

As we tell one of the greatest story of our faith to one another in the days and weeks to come – that of a babe born of a woman in humble circumstances and attended by an unlikely cast of characters - we are sharing a myth. This is not to say that our Christmas stories are lies designed to dupe you, but that they are super-truths – truths about the human need for love and hope so deep, so profound and so universal that we can only understand and share them by telling stories about them.

In these sad and violent days, when we seem as if we are just barely recovered from the news of one act of police or terrorist violence before another one strikes, we need myths more than ever. Not to escape the reality of life, but to sink more deeply into the truths that give us hope and strength in difficult times.

After the first of the year, a decision will be made as to whether they wish to continue on Tuesdays.




SPECIAL OFFERING: Discretionary Fund
