"I think I know why you are called to us," she said as she reminded me of that conversation. "Because we need a pastor now who likes to move furniture."

Even for a person who likes moving, the last month has been packed with an awful lot of change. And yet, the congregation has pulled together and already so much necessary rebuilding work is underway. It is such an honor to be with you during this time of grief, hope and transition, because I have seen how beautifully resilient you are as a congregation. And, I have felt so very clearly the touch of the Holy Spirit on so many interactions and coincidences, large and small.



Unlike a regular interim, we may decide together that it is best for me to stay in leadership, or that it is time for me to move on. Either way, I know the Spirit the guide us all, all the way!

Dear Community Member,

Restorative justice is a new discipline and conflict resolution paradigm that could positively affect our schools and local community/ The Washington State ACLU has generously offered to share this work with our community. We will be looking through the lens of restorative justice in schools.

We are helping the ACLU come to Vancouver. It's a wonderful opportunity to learn together while building community.

As we look at the big issues, gun violence, sexual assault and consent, the school to prison pipeline, mass shootings, violence against religious and racial groups, it seems imperative to invest in positive teachings that root us and our children into our humanity.

Schools are a powerful place to implement restorative justice. Community based research conducted by Clay Mosher with the Collective for Social and Environmental Justice at Washington State University has highlighted persistent equity issues in our schools. Using discipline rates as social indicators of inequities in education, data show that Vancouver schools have some of the highest discipline rates in the state for African American students compared to their white counterparts. The consequences of the policies of Vancouver schools is contributing to systematic injustice.

Our investment in restorative justice should reduce those rates through community education and action. Typically a top-down approach is used to implement it, but we want to also work from the roots up to move faster. The ACLU is offering to lead this work in the larger community.

On August 2, 2016, 5pm to 7pm, the ACLU will conduct a free community event on restorative justice in Vancouver, WA. While the focus is on restorative justice in schools, the paradigm and skill sets are something everyone needs and can use. Implementing restorative justice in as many places as we can in Vancouver is good for our community.

Do You Know" A Series About Our History by Shirl Zent

As we look at the "re-imaging" of our church, I am looking back at the past and how we were at the beginning here on the hill. Of course, my memories only cover MY life here so I will welcome your memories also.

We began here in the early '60s under the leadership of Ted Hastings. We had a lot of young families at that time so we formed a "couples club." We did a lot of good things and a lot of fun things. By the time Bill Graham arrived we had about 20 couples in the group. One of our favorite things was the progressive dinners we had in the Christmas Season. We went to three or four homes for various courses and ended up at someone's home or in Bradford Hall where we partied and had a White Elephant exchange. These "gifts" were so atrocious or gross or just plain hilarious. I won't even share what some of them were except to mention one...the cast from a broken arm. Some were better, some not so much! During Bill's time here we had sensitivity groups and diversity training and would you believe I even a taught a sex ed class? Don't ask and comments to me only please. One day Bill asked me if I would be the church secretary so I worked 3 mornings a week (I loved part time). The office was where the choir room is now and where we store the music was the pastor's office. The stairway that comes up from the outside, just to the east of the office was a major entryway, besides the sanctuary. I would sometimes turn while at my desk and there were people standing there, just dropping in! A little unnerving at times. We had a Head Start program in Bradford Hall...moms and small children. I became a part of their support group. The moms worked with their kids and then fixed lunch. One day, two of the moms came upstairs and asked if I could help them. They had the menu for the week and didn't know what that day's lunch was, they had never heard of it and could I help them fix it. I finished my work and went downstairs and gave a "cooking lesson"...it was creamed tuna over toast. I loved working with them. Everything else upstairs was pretty much open. The sanctuary and a big hallway extending north to the windows. The Cabinet decided they would like to put in a wall and make a room for meetings. Bill Graham liked to build...so he put in the wall. When he got to the windows, he asked my help and I held the windows while he puttied them in. And so begat the Nettie Fries Lounge, named after the wife of Emil Fries, owner of the Piano Hospital and a long time church member.

We also did weddings. People would just show up or call and schedule an appointment to get married. They did spend a little time with Bill before he married them. I totally remember two of the weddings especially. The first one was a lovely black couple who showed up with their little boy, about five or six months old. I got to hold the baby during the service in the sanctuary. The baby grabbed a handful of my blonde hair and just stared at me the entire time...never making a peep. A most memorable event. The other wedding was a couple who came in and the bride had a friend with her to be her maid of honor The groom had no one, so I was asked to be the witness and stand up for the groom. Did that not make the "best man"?

Ah memories, they are what you make them.
