From Our Pastor



In July, I attended the UCC's National Youth Event (NYE) – four days of worship, workshops service and fellowship. One of my fa-

vorite parts of the week was receiving communion together at the end of our closing worship. While rock music played, communion servers moved among the couple thousand young people, offering tiny cups that contained a swig of grape juice sealed under a thin wafer.

As the communion service went on, it became more and more chaotic in the worship space - youth hugged new friends goodbye, or loudly exchanged numbers, or grabbed suitcases from under chairs and ran to catch flights. Some people were singing along with the music, some were taking group selfies and some were trying to figure out how to get their little cups of juice unwrapped. It was not like any communion I had ever attended, but after I got over my initial sense of confusion and entered into the energy of the moment, I found it beautiful. It was cacophony around the table, a chaotic celebration of the feast of the chaotic people of God.

You can get music at a concert hall, something hot to drink at a coffee shop, and someone to talk to on pretty much any city bus, I thought later. But this was a great experience for the youth, because it reminded them that the church offers something that the concert hall or coffee shop or city bus does not, and that is ritual. Rituals are more than just repeated actions. They are repeated actions with the intention of connecting to the Divine. They are as ancient and as necessary as eating and drinking together. And they are as fresh and new as this year's new song.

This weekend, Kristina and I are gathering with our amazing confirmation class and talking about two important church rituals — the sacraments of baptism and communion. Then on Sunday, the youth will lead us in communion as we join with Christians from many corners of the globe in celebrating world communion Sunday. As we celebrate worship and receive communion in a temporary space, our rituals may have a different feeling. We may not hear or see the same things, our movements may not be as smooth as we are used to. Like my experience at NYE, the chaos can be a little jarring. But pay attention, because it can be beautiful too. The cacophony reflecting the complex beauty of God's amazing creation.

Do You Know?



A Series About Our Church's History Straight From the Pen of Shirl Zent

This week I am going to write about the case of the disappearing Jesus! I came to choir rehearsal on a Wednesday night in the spring of 2006. A choir member called to me to look at what was new in the sanctuary, I walked in and looked at the chancel and was completely dumbfounded. On the wall, near the pulpit, was a large carving of Jesus. (I found out later it is called intarsia.) It was especially a surprise because I was on the interiors committee at the time and we were supposed to approve anything that was added to the church and I knew nothing about this. Subsequently I learned a couple of committee members approved this addition. It was a donation from the Steve and Rhoda Page family.

The piece of art stirred up quite a bit of discussion. It was an exquisite work of art BUT, the majority of the congregation did not like the way the eyes seemed to follow them around. I knew that was not the case because I knew that the eyes were focused on the choir! Pastor Ed Evans retired about that time and we welcomed Reverend Carol Joyce a our Interim Minister. Carol did not care for the carving to be so close to the pulpit wo we investigated other places to place it. Another choir rehearsal, another vice calling out...Shirl check out the sanctuary! No carving anywhere...Jesus had left the sanctuary. We searched, and questioned and searched some more, but no Jesus. We were assured HE was safe. I had to admit I had my nose a little out of joint because I had just become Moderator and thought if anyone knew HIS whereabouts, it should be me! Did not happen!

After a year Carole left and Brooks Berndt came on board. There was a discussion that we should put Jesus back up...he was a memorial after all. Jesus reappeared. We all agreed that we would NOT place him up front near the pulpit and agreed to place him on the east wall of the choir area...right where he could watch over the Altos. I did find out where he had been residing for the past year, but I decided to keep that information to myself in case I might need that knowledge some day when we get back in to the church. In the meantime, HE is still in the sanctuary, keeping watch over the clean-up activities.
