Since January I've been seeing a physical therapist to help me rehab a stress injury in my left shoulder. At a recent meeting, I noted with some discouragement, that my arm was actually feeling worse. The PT asked me to show him again how I had been performing the exercises he'd prescribed.

"Hmm, I see," he said, watching the demonstration. "Tell me, are you doing this to the point of stretch, or past the point of stretch... to pain?"

Since I want to progress faster, and I thought pushing further would be make me better sooner, I admitted I had been pulling my left arm and shoulder past the point of comfortable stretch.

"If you push too hard or fast, you can make it worse," he explained, "I think that's why you're having increased discomfort. Pull back. Don't push. Breathe. Be patient."

I don't know about you, but the lesson about being patient is one I seem to be learning in many parts of my life right now. I see a goal ahead and I want to be there at once. Once I am at a pain-free shoulder, for example, or a rebuilt building, I want to believe that every-thing will be right again and the time for patience will be in the past. However, what I have learned is that once I get to the goal, there are a whole *new* set of goals before me. I know what I want my shoulder to feel like. We know what it's like to be housed in a building of our own. Those are beautiful goals, but neither a healthy shoulder or a new building represent any kind of finish line. Once we arrive where we are headed, we know that there will be new opportunities to stretch, to learn, to practice patience.

As we prepare to move back into our building, the temptation is to believe that once we have finally achieved this goal, we will have *arrived* and the time for patience will be over. In reality, once we reach that long-awaited day, there will be *new* opportunities for us – to stretch, to learn, to be patient as individuals and as a community.

The days between Easter (April 1) and Pentecost (May 20) are sometimes called Eastertide. During these days, we encouraged to carry into the world the lessons we've taken to heart during our deepened walk with God during Lent. I'll be looking for ways and places to practice patience. (One good thing about this spiritual practice is that opportunities to be patient abound!) I'll let you know how it goes- and I look forward to hearing from you about how your spiritual practices are taking root and growing, too. In the meantime, don't push, breathe and be patient.

UPDATE FROM THE FAITH ACTION NETWORK

We Oppose the Confirmation of Mike Pompeo and Gina Haspel: An Open Letter

The undersigned individuals and organizations urge Senators Cantwell and Murray and all Washingtonians to oppose the nominations of Mike Pompeo as Secretary of State and of Gina Haspel as Director of the CIA.

Mr. Pompeo is not qualified to be Secretary of State:

- His repeated Islamophobic statements make him unsuited to represent the United States in global affairs, and his confirmation would be an embarrassment and an insult to all who value religious freedom and diversity. It would also lend support to a growing and dangerous Islamophobic movement within the United States.
- His frequent bellicose statements would make it more likely for the U.S. to enter an unnecessary, deadly, and expensive war. $\begin{bmatrix} 1\\ SEP \end{bmatrix}$
- His support for torture demonstrates that he does not respect human rights and the rule of law.

Ms. Haspel is not qualified to be Director of the CIA

As chief of base at a CIA "black site," she oversaw the use of torture. No one with a history of participation in torture should lead the CIA. Her confirmation would signal a normalization of torture, perpetuate the falsehood that torture was legal and could be made legal again, and encourage future human rights abuses in the agency.

Her participation in the destruction of evidence of CIA torture reveals a blatant disregard for law, transparency and accountability

UPDATE FROM THE CENTRAL PACIFIC CONFERENCE

Over the last three weeks, more than 200 people from 31 CPC congregations gathered for conversation, connection, and listening together for how God is moving in and through our conference. Like starlings who move dip, turn, and rise together, we are listening for the murmurings of the Spirit and how the Spirit is calling us to live and move as the CPC today. Who is God calling us to be as the CPC? How can we connect better to each other? What can God do through us that we cannot do alone as individuals or individual churches?

The Board of Directors launched the Starling Project as way to live into our covenant during this time of transition in the conference. Reflective of our church structure, where autonomy rests with our local churches, we want to the hopes, dreams, and yearnings of our members and churches to guide how we move as a conference. Our Designated Term Conference Minister, Rev. Molly Carlson, is helping us move through this time of listening, visioning, and dreaming. It's an exciting time to be part of our conference.

The Starling Project continues in April with online conversations based around affinity groups. During more than ten gatherings around common characteristics or roles such as "Rural Churches," "Musicians," and "Longer-Term Members (30+ years in the UCC)," we will listen to each other's deep gladness, deep hungers, and how God may be inviting us into new movement together. These conversations will take place over Zoom, our web-based meeting platform. Participant from home! All you will need is a log-in code and phone *or* a computer with internet connection.
