Alongside our partners at the Rural Organizing Project, we are excited to invite you on a very special pilgrimage from Sheridan to NORCOR.

For one week, rural Oregonians, members of faith communities, immigrant and long-time residents of our state will march together from Sheridan Federal Prison (FCI Sheridan) to the Northern Oregon Regional Correctional

Facility (NORCOR) in The Dalles. Both FCI Sheridan and NORCOR--a regional jail--hold contracts with Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), renting beds to ICE in order to lock up immigrants and refugees seeking asylum.

We invite you to join us on a 7-day pilgrimage to demand an end to the 2 ICE contracts in Oregon and to call for dismantling all systems of detention and deportation.

We demand:

The release of all migrants from incarceration An end to the ICE contract at FCI Sheridan An end the ICE contract at NORCOR

We call on our neighbors to:

Vote no on Measure 105 in order to protect Oregon's "sanctuary" law that prevents local resources (like law enforcement) from being used to detain immigrants and refugees living in Oregon.

Our vision is:

A welcoming community, with the repeal of all laws that make migration a crime and the dismantling of systems of detention and deportation.

Faith communities throughout Oregon have been organizing alongside partners to push ICE out of our communities. In Josephine County and the City of Springfield, organizers ended their jails' ICE contracts. The administrator of NORCOR who expanded the 4-county contract with ICE just submitted his letter of resignation. Asylum-seekers are being released from Sheridan. We have shown up for rallies, interfaith worship services, strengthened sanctuary policies in our cities, and organized rapid response teams to show up at courthouses. And we've won.

We now demand that FCI Sheridan and NORCOR end their ICE contracts. We call upon our neighbors to vote no on Measure 105 to defend Oregon's 30-year-old sanctuary law. We call upon the Trump administration and Congress to end the brutal attack on immigrants and refugees and to repeal all laws that criminalize migration, put people in cages, and separate families every day. **Join us for the entire journey, or for a day or an evening.** Every day we will walk or caravan and hold community gatherings or public events in the evening. Large events will take place in Sheridan, Portland and The Dalles. Each night we will set up camp in communities along the way (with alternative accommodations as available).



LEAP TO CONTINUE WITH A NEW CLASS

With a part-time pastor, we are blessed to have a deep bench of lay pastors. This year, a new class of four will be joining the four LEAP (Locally Empowered and Authorized Preachers) graduates, with a total of 8 lay preachers being trained and continuing to offer support and feedback to each other over time. We will all have the opportunity to hear some new as well as some familiar voices from the pulpit. You will have a chance to "meet" each of these preachers in person in a future Link. In the meantime, here is a reminder of the grounding for our LEAP experience, from Ed Martin:

The Protestant Reformation was founded on the doctrine of the priesthood of all believers, which means that each of us is called to ministry through our baptism. Accordingly, there is to be no clergy or laity class distinction in which the clergy has particular access to the divine and laity are the secondary recipients of that access. In the words of Paul: "Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone. To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good."

Unfortunately, for a variety of reasons, the Reformation was never able to realize the full import of this doctrine. Within the Reformed tradition (the tradition of the UCC), a concern for "learned" ministry evolved into a "professionalized" ministry which, like other professions, implied an academically trained person who provided services to client recipients. As a consequence, all of the gifts and practices of ministry were conflated into one person who was hired to provide religious services. "Spiritual" matters were deemed the bailiwick of the clergy and "practical management" matters were assigned to the laity through work on committees of the church. Little attention has been given to the idea that each of us is called to ministry through our baptism in accordance with the gifts we have been given by the Spirit.

This is the gap that LEAP is helping to fill. So far, it is has been a great success, and we look forward to continuing to live out the foundational reformation ideal of the "priesthood of all believers."
