As of Sunday, 12/16, we have closed this year's stewardship campaign, although if you still have a card to turn in, we'll still be happy to receive it.

I am pleased to report that we received **98** pledge cards representing pledges totaling **\$226,282** for the 2019 Operating Budget. We ended short of our

\$228,880 goal by **\$2,598**. The final figures will be updated in the draft budget to be presented to the congregation in January.

Over the last two plus years, we have experienced first hand how much we can accomplish together with the help of the Holy Spirit. Now, God is truly "doing a new thing" among us as we move into 2019.

There are so many reasons to give. We give because we have hope in the good things God will continue to do in the community and the world through our congregation. FREEZER FUND We Would Love Your Help!

Our beautiful new kitchen has been a wonderful addition to our newly re-imagined building. We are a commercial grade kitchen except for one important item. We do not have a commercial freezer. Funds from the insurance company were not enough to purchase a new commercial freezer for our kitchen.

We are currently utilizing the old, small residential freezer we had before the fire. This will work for our own use for freezing things like cookies or ice. However, if we wish to freeze items that will be used for things such as feeding the homeless, have building rentals including use of the kitchen or hold any large event, we must have a larger commercial freezer.

We would like to purchase a freezer that has double doors and is 54" wide and meets Health Department regulations. This will be very similar in style to our current refrigerator.

The estimated cost of the freezer is \$2,500 including tax. A fund has been established and several hundred dollars in seed money has already been donated. To help us attain our goal of \$2,500, you may write a check and note **Freezer** on the memo line and drop it in the offering plate any Sunday mornings or you may mail a check to the church. If you would like to make a cash donation, we request that it be in a sealed envelope and clearly marked **Freezer** on the envelope. You may also place this in the offering plate.
