We can discern together another kind of reimagining project. We know that, as a group, we can rise to the occasion to face challenges, to work together, and to create something new.


Christ calls us to a transformation of ourselves and the world around us. How will we utilize that knowledge going forward?

My name is Ihan, and when you visit me in the detention center where I'm held without my mom, you visit Jesus.

My name is Rahelamma, and I know it's hard to pronounce and my English isn't very good, but when you try your best it sounds to me and to Jesus something like "hallelujah."

(c) their own wine and beer. Beer and wine would be served by the glass and would only be allowed in the building on the day of the event.
