I did not know until this year that Lent is not a church word, although you usually only hear it in church these days. In olden times, it was just the everyday word for "springtime." And speaking of Easter, that's not a church word either. It's from the name Eostre, a pre-Christian English goddess celebrated in spring time.

I love that the names of our most important season of the year come from words that started far before and outside of the church. It reminds me that the rhythms and themes of this time of year – redemption, reflection, resurrection did not originate in the church, and cannot be contained by it. The need for these things is as deep as our humanity. They live in our bones. We need to experience them with all of our senses. And so every year, as the days lengthen and the growing things start to bud, we yearn for the rituals and rhythms of springtime – so we eat lamb and search for eggs and gather together to remember and remind each other that life comes around every year and death does not ever have the last word.

BECOMING IMMIGRANT WELCOMING



What Are We Doing: We are engaging in study, reflection and discussion to discern if our congregation is being called to become Immigrant Welcoming – a designation of the United Church of Christ.

Why Are We Doing This: The General Synod of the United Church of Christ, and our own Central Pacific Conference have passed resolutions calling on congregations to covenant as Immigrant Welcoming. The UCC recognizes the ongoing struggles of refugees and migrants who come to the United States seeking safety, security, freedom and opportunity but instead experience suffering as they fear raids, deportation, and witness their families being torn apart. Our Jewish and Christian traditions honor this text: When an immigrant resides with you in your land, you shall not oppress the immigrant. The immigrant who resides with you shall be to you as the citizen among you; you shall love the immigrant as yourself, for you were immigrants in the land of Egypt. (Leviticus 19:33-34)

Jesus said, *You shall love your neighbor as yourself*. There is no other commandment greater than this. (Mark 12:31)

Our own mission statement reflects our history of being welcoming and loving to all neighbors. It is the mission of our church to follow Christ in faith and lead the community by example. We worship together with creativity and joy, being rooted in but not root-bound by Christian tradition. We commit ourselves to:

Encourage spiritual growth and loving service to others; Reach out to people of all races, backgrounds, gender expressions/identities and affectional orientations;

Work for social justice and peace.

Why Now: The International Association for Refugees has stated, "The world is in the midst of a long-term refugee crisis." There are more displaced persons in the world right now than at any time since WWII. So although the needs are greater than ever

before, some of our national leaders are perpetuating myths that our borders are being attacked, that there is a scarcity of resources so they must be hoarded, and that "white culture" must be protected from people of color.

Volunteers from No More Deaths, an Arizona-based aid group, left jugs of water and cans of food in the dessert for migrants and were caught, prosecuted and might go to prison. Border Patrol officers routinely dump out jugs of water that are placed by churches and other humanitarian groups in long stretches of desert.

Families seeking asylum, which is a legal act, have been separated and detained at our southern border and Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) has misplaced files causing many parents to be unable to locate and reunite with their children.

Immigrants in Portland and Vancouver have been picked up by ICE after dropping children off at school, when leaving work, etc. tearing families apart and often being unable to even contact their families for days.

If We Vote To Become Immigrant Welcoming, What's Next: We will commit as a congregation and as individuals to prayerfully seek a response to the injustices against the immigrants and migrants in our midst, answering the call to love our neighbors. Responses may include educating, advocating and supporting.

Education

We will continue with suggested books, films, and readings on immigration and migration including learning about root causes of the current worldwide displacement of people. We will hear from immigrants and their families in our community and seek to build relationship through worship, service projects and community events.

<u>Advocacy</u>

We will work with local organizations that work for immigrant justice such as Faith Action Network (FAN), Interfaith Movement for Immigrant Justice (IMIrJ), http://imirj.org/faith-community-resources, Lutheran Refugee Resettlement Services, etc., to offer public forums on immigration-related issues for the wider community and participate in their legislative actions.


We will bear witness by participating in vigils, direct actions, public events and visits with elected officials.

<u>Accompaniment</u>

We will accompany immigrants at their request, to immigration hearings, appointments, and meetings as we are able. We will work with Lutheran Refugee Resettlement Services to continue to provide material support such as Refugee Restart Kits or other financial support.

Hooray, the blossoms of spring are beginning to show in our community! Please share some of your natural beauties with us for Easter




