



Dear Friends,

In the scripture reading coming up on August 11 (Luke 12:32-40), Jesus gives several commands to his disciples and followers. Are you looking for a way to pray in these dog days of summer? Give this a try. Pick a week during the month, and spend each day trying to put these commands into practice. Ask yourself which (if any) seem easy and obvious, and which (if any) seem too difficult to undertake.

MONDAY: "Do not be afraid."

The passage begins with what is perhaps one of the most often repeated commands in the Bible, "do not be afraid." Why do you think this is such a common greeting in the Bible? Consider the things you fear. Are there any fears that you might be ready to outgrow or put behind you?

TUESDAY: "Sell your possessions and give to the poor."

You may have heard it said that what you own ends up owning you. How are your possessions coming between you and a deeper relationship with God or neighbor? What would it take for you to give of your own abundance to someone who has less than you?

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LETTER FROM OUR PASTOR CONTINUED

WEDNESDAY: *"Provide purses for yourselves that will not wear out, a treasure in heaven that will never fail."*

In this passage, Jesus invites you to put your confidence in God's promise, rather than the false promises heaped on you by advertisements and media. What do you put your confidence in? What would it take for you to know that you could rely on God?

THURSDAY: "Be dressed ready for service and keep your lamps burning."

Sometimes an opportunity to serve God or neighbor passes by just because we are not expecting such an opportunity to arise. How can you prepare for service's call, and how can you respond to it when it comes?

FRIDAY: "You also must be ready, because the Son of Man will come at an hour when you do not expect him."

Just as we sometimes miss an opportunity to serve, so too do we miss opportunities to recognize the face of Christ. Can you think of a time that you recognized Christ when you were not expecting to?

In the United Church of Christ, we often say that we take the bible "seriously but not literally." How does reading this passage in this deliberate way, over the course of a week, help you take the Bible more seriously? Are there are other passages you might want to approach this way? How can slowing down in your Bible study help you slow down in the rest of your life?

Enjoy these last, slow days of summer, and I'll see you in church.

Update from Safety Committee Ken Rowe


You may have been hearing about the Church Safety Committee, particularly since the false smoke alarm went off a couple of weeks ago.

BEING AN IMMIGRANT WELCOMING CONGREGATION

"While every refugee's story is different and their anguish personal, they all share a common thread of uncommon courage – the courage not only to survive, but to persevere and rebuild their shattered lives." – Antonio Guterres, U.N. High Commissioner for Refugees

Refugee Facts:

There are 68.5 million people around the world who have been forcibly displaced – the highest level of displacement since WW II.

Every minute, 20 people leave everything behind to escape war, persecution, or terror.

Among the forcibly displaced, there are 25.4 million refugees, 40 million people displaced in their own country, and 3.1 million asylum seekers awaiting determination on refugee status.

Syrians now comprise one of the largest groups of refugees worldwide, making up 24.8% of the 19.9 million refugees under the mandate of UNHCR.

How can I help?

Lutheran Community Services Northwest (LCSNW) is the designated agency to help with refugee resettlement in Clark County. Refugees arrive here with literally only the clothes they are wearing and maybe a few personal items. They need to find an apartment, furnish it, fill out paperwork, enter



employment programs, register children for school, etc. LCSNW assists with these needs.

LCSNW also has an *Immigration Counseling and Advocacy Program* the helps reunite families through immigration legal advocacy and assistance. They have Immigration Counselors and an Immigration Attorney on staff.

<u>Donate</u> Gift Cards from Winco, IKEA, Target, or Fred Meyer to Lutheran Community Services NW. Enclose a note saying

"Vancouver R&P". To make a cash donation, make checks payable to Lutheran Community Services and write "Vancouver R&P" in the memo line. Mail to LCSNW attn.: Mindy Johnston, 3600 Main St., Suite 200, Vancouver, WA 98663.

<u>Volunteer</u> to be an ESL tutor. Prior experience in ESL or teaching is necessary. The minimum commitment is 6 months, meeting at the student's home for 3 hours per week. Contact 360-787-4726.

<u>Volunteer</u> to help with transportation. Help a newly-arrived refugee family get to appointments, learn how to navigate and use public transportation. Contact 360-787-4726.

<u>Volunteer</u> to be an International Foster Care Family. Catholic Community Services of Western WA is recruiting families who want to help unaccompanied refugee children. You will be provided with training, support, and financial assistance. Contact 360-213-2431.

<u>Advocate</u> by keeping up with local, state, and federal legislation. Our WA State 2019 legislative session is over. Several immigrant related bills passed including the Keep WA Working Bill (5497) which protects local law enforcement from having to cooperate with ICE raids or illegal arrests.

Also the H-2A Temporary Agricultural Program (5438) establishes an office in the Employment

Security Department for H-2A temporary agricultural workers who are key to much of our state's economy.

Our congregation is a Faith Action Network (FAN) member and they help facilitate our legislative advocacy. <u>www.fanwa.org</u>.

The Interfaith Movement for Immigrant Justice (IMIrJ) in Oregon, is our partner in keeping us informed on local vigils, rallies, etc in Oregon and SW WA <u>www.imirj.org</u>.

Join the Justice and Peace Action Network of our denomination <u>https://www.ucc.org/</u> join_the_network to get legislative action alerts and a newsletter on many issues including immigration.

Covenant between First Congregational United Church of Christ Metropolitan Community Church of the Gentle Shepherd & Martha's Pantry Vancouver, Washington

In both the United Church of Christ and the Metropolitan Community Church, we believe that **covenant** is a cornerstone of faith and action. Covenant is a relationship with at least three partners, because one of those partners is always the Holy Spirit.

First Congregational United Church of Christ, Metropolitan Community Church of the Gentle Shepherd and Martha's Pantry enter both joyfully and solemnly into the following **covenant with one another**:

We will support one another's ministries and programs with prayer, time, and resources as we seek to serve God in our city, state, region, and world. 
