It's also a chance to look ahead and think creatively about the changes that we might face in the coming year. How do we want to meet those changes? What will our response be?

Some people make resolutions at this time of year. I usually make one or two myself. I find resolution-making to be very consistent with my spiritual practice. Because, really, resolutions are just intentions, right? And doesn't the Christian life ask of us that we live as intentionally as possible in following Christ's way?

This year, I'm tempted to make a resolution that the only change in my life will be change I can choose. But that's a temptation I'm trying to resist. Because my REAL resolution is to face change as gracefully as I can, even (or maybe ESPECIALLY) when the changes that come are not ones I would have chosen.

Spirituality Group—New Meeting Time



ED FRANK—HONOR FLIGHT TRIP

Ed Frank, who recently moved from Washington state to the Trinity Springs assisted living facility in Oxford along with his wife, Ruby, enjoyed a busy day in our nation's capital as he saw the various war memorials dedicated to veterans of all eras.

"It was pretty great," Frank said late Wednesday night after returning to American Legion Post 347 for a Welcome Home ceremony. "It wasn't as strenuous as I thought it would be."



Frank served in the Navy and was stationed aboard the USS Montpelier (CL-57), a light cruiser that was commissioned in 1942 and participated in several campaigns in the Pacific Theater. He also served in the Armed Forces Induction Station and in officer's training and ROTC.

Early Wednesday afternoon, Frank's daughter, Villager Jackie Kramme, said she was thrilled that her father was getting to take part in Honor Flight.

I'm really excited and happy for him," she said. "I'm just glad he was able to do this. He's such a go-getter," added Kramme, who said her father acts more like a spry 80-yearold than someone just three years shy of 100. "I'm sure he's having a great time," she added. "He's never met a stranger."

Frank's guardian on the flight, Army veteran Ron Kaissling, could attest to that. "It was a fantastic day," he said. "I was trying to keep up with a 97-year-old who's unbelievable. He had more women hugging his neck," the Village of Freedom Pointe resident added with a chuckle.

Villager Debbie Diroff, a longtime Villages Honor Flight volunteer who served as second in command behind Flight Director Rob Hempel, called Frank an unbelievable person and said she thoroughly enjoyed getting to know him.

"He was spry and sharp as all get-out," she said. "He was just a joy to be with all day." Diroff said it was obvious that Frank was having a great time. "He loves to talk to people and he's just a very likable person," she said. "He never napped on the plane and he was go, go, go."



ED FRANK—HONOR FLIGHT TRIP



Wednesday's trip marked Villages Honor Flight's fourth and final flight for 2019. Most of the veterans who made the trip served during Korea and Vietnam. Frank and two others served during World War II and many others served during the 1940s, 1950s, the Berlin Crisis and the Cold War.

All told, 20 served in the Army, 13 in the Navy, six in the Air Force and two in the Marine Corps. They came from Altoona, Astor, Clermont, Fruitland Park, Jacksonville, Leesburg, Mount Dora, Ocala, Oxford, Summerfield and The Villages.

Villages Honor Flight serves Central Florida veterans from Citrus, Lake, Marion, Putnam and Sumter Counties. Each veteran has a volunteer guardian to assist him/her. The trip is free for veterans, while guardians and staff pay their own way. The organization has flown more than 1,400 veterans since its first flight in May 2012.

Villages Honor Flight will conduct a flightless mission on Nov. 23 for veterans who cannot manage the airline flight to Washington, D.C. For more information, veteran and volunteer applications, go to www.villageshonorflight.org. Villages-News.com
