To the bottle in the ditch, to the scoop in the oats, to air in the lung let evening come.


Let it come, as it will, and don't be afraid. God does not leave us comfortless, so let evening come.

Vancouver First Congregational, United Church of Christ Mission Statement

On May 12, our Council took on a visioning task for how we can "be the church" during this pandemic, utilizing the above two documents. Our leadership definitely met this challenge. With prayer and discussion, each member helped with planning ways that we can provide for the spiritual and practical needs of our congregation while we continue "in exile" from our beautiful church building. We made plans for everything from expanding our online worship offerings with inclusion of hymns we can join in at home to ways to continue and expand our support of Martha's Pantry. Also, we worked on ways that we can help support families who are struggling with their work needs and teaching their children at home. Our Circles of Care are a new form of 'deacons' with facilitators contacting and praying with individuals in their geographic areas.

Our task groups are committed to maintain a level of excellence in serving our congregation. Each group is meeting to make plans for how we can continue to meet the needs of our members, serve our community, and stay safe as we do that. Our conference minister, Tyler Connoley; our national office of the United Church of Christ; our insurance partners; the CDC; our Washington State Governor, Jay Inslee; and Clark County Health advisors have all provided directions for us to consider as we move forward from our isolation to engaging with others without a cure, vaccine, or end to this coronavirus in sight. With this in mind I quote the national UCC leadership: "We want to send a clear and strong message to congregations who are considering going back to meeting in person: We urge you to wait until ALL safety concerns have been addressed."

We are all in this together, even as we are alone in our isolation. We cannot rush this process. We must prayerfully support each other, reach out to each other using our resources and beautiful spirits. We are people of faith and we know we can 'be the church" we're meant to be and we will come out stronger on the other side of this crisis.

Update from your Financial Secretary

Again, I want to thank all of you who have been able to continue submitting donations to the church. This has allowed us to continue paying our staff and our expenses.

Last month we introduced our first electronic giving option with Vanco, our e-giving partner. This option is found on the church's website at www.vanucc.org, where you can click on the red donate button.

The second electronic giving option is found by adding the GivePlus App on your smart phone. Enter our church name (Vancouver United Church of Christ) and you are taken to the church's donation page where you are asked to create an account. The app will retain this information for the next time you login. Here you also have the option of donating by credit card or from your checking/savings account. You can set up a one-time donation or a reoccurring donation. If using a credit card, there is the option of paying to offset the cost of the processing fee (2.75%). We encourage you to do this to minimize expenses for the church.

We will always accept checks mailed to the church if you wish to continue giving in that manner. Thirdly, for anyone who wishes to text their donation, you may use GivePlus Text at this number: 833-619-0911.

Thank you to those who have already given electronically! Our hope is that by offering electronic giving we can make supporting our church's mission easier, not only for our members and friends but for our community.



June Special Offering Triple Point Youth Program

For the last several years, our church has supported the wonderful Triple Point program. This is a support program for local LGBTQ+ youth in our community. During this time of pandemic, your gifts to this program can literally save lives. Stephen Herndon, Program Facilitator, explains:

What if your community support outside of your family stopped overnight?

What if you were a young person and your family did not accept you for being LGBTQ?

What if you identified as LGBTQ and your family didn't know? Triple Point provides support groups for LGBTQ+ youth 11-18 years old and has been going strong for 21 years. A pandemic hit and our lives were put on hold; our support systems were unavailable for our youth. Although there are many supportive families, sadly there are many that are not.

As the Triple Point program facilitator, these youth are on my mind daily and I hope that they are all getting along at home. Hopefully soon we can all come back together, gather, eat snacks, and talk about the way things 'were' during these times.

My hope is that they are connecting with each other and now that we have our 'Virtual' Triple Point groups going weekly, that they will join us online to share what has been hard, what has been good and what they wish for in the future. These youth are our future and our hope. And when this has passed, when we can see each other again, I hope that we open our hearts, minds and arms to these precious youth. JUNE IS PRIDE MONTH



PBS is celebrating LGTBQ+ Pride Month with the launch of PRIDELAND, a new one-hour special and short-form digital series following host and actor Dyllón Burnside (from FX's "Pose") on a journey across the South. The sixepisode short-form series will launch on *PBS Voices,* a new documentary-focused YouTube Channel by PBS Digital Studios, beginning Tuesday, May 26. A one-hour companion special, also hosted by Burnside, will premiere on Friday, June 12 at 9:00 p.m. ET (check local listings) on PBS, <u>PBS.org</u> and the <u>PBS Video</u> <u>App</u>.

PRIDELAND, produced by <u>Tiny Horse</u>, opens a window into the world of modern-day LGBTQ+ life in America. The series highlights authentic personal stories brought to life through Burnside's curious, exploratory lens. As an LGBTQ+ advocate, he guides viewers into the South's various LGBTQ+ communities, connecting with people of different locations backgrounds, experiences, and points of view.





Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender and Queer (LGBTQ) Pride Month is currently celebrated each year in the month of June to honor the 1969 Stonewall Uprising in Manhattan. The Stonewall Uprising was a tipping point for the Gay Liberation Movement in the United States.

In the United States the last Sunday in June was initially celebrated as "Gay Pride Day," but the actual day was flexible. In major cities across the nation the "day" soon grew to encompass a month-long series of events. Today, celebrations include pride parades, picnics, parties, workshops, symposia and concerts, and LGBTQ Pride Month events attract millions of participants around the world. Memorials are held during this month for those members of the community who have been lost to hate crimes or HIV/AIDS. The purpose of the commemorative month is to recognize the impact that lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender individuals have had on history locally, nationally, and internationally.
