

Ukrainians have been trickling into the US from Mexico since early February. They are entering using Humanitarian Parole.

Once in the US they will be able to seek asylum. Lutheran Community Services Northwest is not clear yet as to what needs to be done to support these people as the US government has not contracted with any local organizations so far.

Unlike Afghans, Ukrainian refugees coming to the US must have relatives here so, initially, they can stay with family. Once LCSNW understands what benefits and services Ukrainians are eligible for then I will let you know how volunteers can help.

During the week of April 10 an average of 1058 Ukrainian refugees were on our southern border each day. They are waiting two to four days for US officials to admit them on humanitarian parole.

UKRAINE: LCS NORTHWEST READY TO HELP, NEEDS FEDERAL RESOURCES

A statement from President and CEO David Duea—April 21, 2022

The <u>announcement</u> today by President Biden offering a lifeline to war-weary Ukrainians is a positive development. It begins to give structure to his pledge last month to admit up to 100,000 Ukrainian refugees into the United States.

At LCS Northwest, we stand with all displaced people, including Ukrainians and others who are fleeing imminent threats to their families, leading many of them to mass at the U.S.-Mexico border. By granting two-year humanitarian parole status to Ukrainians, the White House has opened a pathway for us to serve some of the world's desperate people, similar to our work resettling more than 700 Afghans in Washington and Oregon over the past six months.

However, there are many crucial details left up in the air, particularly with regard to funding. Calling on extended families and nonprofit groups to sponsor Ukrainian refugees will only go so far. The cost of housing, transportation and health care—in addition to mental health, legal aid and other specialized services provided by resettlement agencies like ours—is significant.

If U.S. officials want to welcome Ukrainians with the same resolve as they did the Afghan people, it will also require a government financial commitment.

We look forward to getting more clarity from national leaders in the coming days. Having resettled more than 2,000 Ukrainians in Washington and Oregon over the past five years, LCS Northwest is well equipped for the task at hand. We have recently hired Ukrainian case managers. We are rebuilding our resettlement infrastructure. And we are determined to help meet this moment.

SPECIAL OFFERING FOR MAY TRIPLE POINT YOUTH PROGRAM



For the last several years, our church has supported the wonderful Triple Point program. This is a support program through The Children's Home Society for LGBTQ+ youth in our community, your gifts to this program can literally save lives.

Stephen Herndon, Program Facilitator, explains: What if your community support outside of your family stopped overnight? What if you were a young person and your family did not accept you for being LGBTQ? What if you identified as LGBTQ and your family didn't know? Triple Point provides support groups for LGBTQ+ youth 11-18 years old and has been going strong since 1996. Triple Point weathered the Pandemic and now we are back to in person services in Downtown Vancouver. This incredible program has supported hundreds of LGBTQ+ youth over the years and continues to do that through weekly support groups. We all know the importance of community and Triple Point has been here for our youth.

Triple Point works directly in our schools providing support to not only our youth but to

the educators and staff for a better understanding of what it means to identify as LGBTQ+. Children's Home Society of Washington also provides child and family counseling to our youth that are interested. We also work with our local PFLAG chapter that supports the families of our youth for a more well rounded service. UPDATED POLICIES

Council wants to make you aware of two recently adopted written policies. You may request copies from Elizabeth Spannring, Office Administrator or view the pdfs on the main page of the email.

Non-discrimination and Anti-Harassment Policy

This addresses the prohibition of unlawful discrimination or harassment in church activities. Most businesses and organizations have a similar written policy. It addresses prevention, reporting, investigation, remedial action, prohibition against retaliation, and training. Employees, Council, and volunteers who regularly interact with vendors/outside organizations or serve in volunteer leadership roles will be required to receive training.

Code of Conduct: Interaction with Children, Youth, and Vulnerable Adults Policy

This sets standards for interactions and establishes requirements for those working with children, youth, or vulnerable adults. Those regularly interacting with children, youth, or vulnerable adults are required to complete an application and disclosure form for review and approval; and then successfully complete a background check. Training is required for Council and employees and volunteers who regularly interact with children.

Required Training: Training will consist of reviewing the policies and, in addition, online training in a group or individual setting.

Specific curriculum (video, etc.) is being identified for use and will begin after mid-May.



A GROUNDED FAITH

This Lenten season about a dozen of us chose to not just give up chocolate. Instead, we studied together about a way to look at scripture and our faith more from the perspective of what we've done in the name of Christianity to our planet, spiritual people we've ignored because they were theologically different than us, and how we might learn to be better stewards of our planet.

Our guidebook for this Lenten faith journey was the daily devotional guide "A Grounded Faith". It featured a different author for each of the Lenten seven weeks, giving richness and diversity to these subjects. For instance, we learned about efforts to repudiate the Doctrine of Discovery, reflected about our own intergenerational and origin stories and thought about various forms of sabbath, the connection between the planet and what we eat, and the connection between 'progress' and eco-system destruction.

We deepened what we had learned in weekly meetings which also added some fun to the exercise. But you're not too late to experience something similar. If you're looking for a new way to focus your own daily devotional discipline, we'd love to help you get started.


Bret is an avid outdoorsman and
