They found that it was too much to afford synagogue membership, high holiday services, etc, and that the members were too focused on what each person's career was and not on the community. They joined a non-denominational church where they are very involved.

When ilana was in college she was part of a Hillel and tried synagogues out of school but none seemed to fit the sense of a spiritual family. One night llana was at a motel at a veterinary convention and out of curiosity started reading the new bible as this was forbidden in her religion.

Then ilana's ex-wife brought her to her Presbyterian church. Soon she was baptized by immersion which both boys who were toddlers at the time still remember to this day. However, even that church wasn't too excepting of their family and made it known to them.

They belonged to a great church in Eugene where the boys played with the pastor's kids

and had sleep-over's with them and ran around the church and everyone knew them.

Then her divorce happened in 2018. ilana tried going back to the synagogue again but couldn't afford Sunday school and membership dues and never really felt a community bond there. They would never be okay knowing that ilana was baptized or her belief in Jesus as the Messiah. This would make her Christian and no longer Jewish. ilana wasn't okay with giving up her Jewish roots and considers herself a messianic Jew who believes in Christ as the Messiah.

ilana tried a messianic church her in town mostly made up of Christians who wanted to worship as Jews with only the rabbi and one or two others who were Jewish. They didn't accept their family and they had to leave during a homophobic sermon while the boys were still wearing their yamakas.

Then ilana tried a nondenominational church here in Vancouver and enjoyed the weekly bible study and small groups where they would meet at people's homes to go over that week's sermon. Until the sermon that month was about homosexuality in the bible and how that was a sin and obviously, that didn't fly so ilana left that church. Even though there were some nice people there.

ilana was trying to find a church family like they had in Eugene. She found it HERE! ilana will never forget Pastor Jennifer giving her some animal ears for the service that day telling her "this was a spontaneous pageant so here you go and welcome" everyone was very welcoming and made her want to come back in the following weeks to get to know them more.



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CARE FOR OUR EARTH BE THE POLLUTION SOLUTION

We all realize our next generation will be faced with critical environmental issues – climate change, plastic pollution, species extinction – **created by our actions**. They will have no idea how to solve these crises in the time frame we've given them unless we arm them with the information they need to make better decisions than we did. So, let's start by learning about plastic

- Plastic is made of oil and chemical additives.
- At every point of the plastic-making process, pollution is created through oil extraction, transportation, oil refining, the petrochemical plant, and the plastics factory.
- Oil is NOT a renewable resource at the rate we use it, so eventually, we're going to run out.
- Chemicals and additives are not bound to the plastic structure, so when subjected to time, wear & tear, heat, or edible acids, the bond disappears and the chemicals and additives are set free in the environment, or in YOU.

Many of the chemicals in plastic are hormone disruptors which can harm every organ in your body

- PLASTIC IS **NOT** BIODEGRADABLE OR COMPOSTABLE AND IS ONLY RECYCLED ON A SMALL SCALE.
- PLASTIC NEVER GOES AWAY! It degrades or breaks down into tiny pieces called microplastics. Microplastics attract free-floating toxins already in our environment, making them even MORE toxic.
- Scientists have found plastic literally everywhere...on land, in our ocean, rivers, and streams, in our air, in our sea animals, in our food and drinking water, and in OUR HUMAN BODIES.

You and I can not fix this by ourselves but if each of us makes a few changes, together we can make a Great Difference.

TIP FOR TODAY: ON THE GO PLASTICS.

Stop using plastic cups, straws, utensils, bags, and masks. Substitute with your own coffee cup or water bottle (even bring it to church), bamboo or stainless steel straws, bamboo utensils, your own to-go containers, canvas or recycled bags, and cotton masks if appropriate.

I carry a stainless steel straw and a Titanium spork (which weighs almost nothing) in my purse at all times. I am working on my memory which needs help in remembering to carry a togo box when I go out to eat. Half my meal is usually lunch the next day.

Please stop drinking water from plastic bottles sold by the billions at every store. Not only is the bottle a huge problem, but the plastic also leaches into the water and then into your body. A very small percentage of bottles are recycled.
