

POLLUTION SOLUTION FOR JUNE PICNIC TIME!

At this point, we have had a taste of the warm sun of summer and our thoughts are going to outings and picnics. Now is the time to prepare to use less plastic and to take home everything you take out for your picnic. Here are my suggestions based on what my sister and I have designed.

1. Have a permanent picnic basket or bag, preferably not plastic.



- 2. Load with the following items:
- Plates and Bowls that are plastic you already have, Corelle that doesn't break easily, or compostable paper plates are available at most stores now. I found mine at Target which has a whole section of nonplastic options.
- Silverware which could be reusable bamboo or metal leftover old tableware or purchased at places like Retails or Goodwill and used only for your picnic basket. See what kind of container you can find in the house. I did buy a plastic container years

- ago (before my limit plastic life) but now I would find a fabric bag.
- Cutting Knives and Serving Spoons that are bamboo or maybe old but usable plastic that you want to replace with non-plastic.
 Usable plastic has no scratches that can leak chemicals.




- Glasses and Cups that are relegated from your current household plastic (replace with glass) or "look like plastic" glasses that are made from plant-based products. Use these as long as you can. A great alternative would be for each person to bring a nonplastic water bottle. If they don't all have one, now would be a good time to invest. Remember we don't want to be drinking water from plastic bottles that leach plastic into the water and thus into us!!
- A Tablecloth that is cotton or other nonplastic material. We have had the same one for years and it always brings up many good memories when we put it on the table.
- Napkins should be cloth or old hand towels, anything that is not single use.
- Container to load dirty dishes in to bring home to wash and return to your picnic basket. Get creative with this.
- Garbage Bags again that are compostable for anything dirty that needs to come home.
- Food Bags that are not single-use like the ones you can buy that are silicone and can be used many times.
- 3. It is obviously easier to use plastic throw away but those days should be gone. With this plan, you can come close to having a non-plastic nature-loving picnic. HAVE FUN!

MISSION AND OUTREACH NEWS





Everyone is invited to purchase *one or more* solar panels which Clark PUD will install on publicly owned buildings as part of a large project.

REASONS AND BENEFITS

- We have a Christian imperative to protect future generations from the consequences of burning fossil fuels.
- You will receive full credit for all the electricity produced by your share of the project.
- No need for you to mess with your roof or get bids from multiple contractors.
- Large projects achieve economies of scale.

As Buckminster Fuller once said . . . "To change something, build a new model that makes the existing model obsolete."

Or in our words "To transition away from fossil fuels, we first need to first replace them with something cleaner."

The more solar panels we install everywhere, the less Clark PUD needs to run its fossil fuel power plant and the cheaper the panels become.

Clark Public Utilities is now receiving contractor bids, and expects to choose the lowest responsible bid by June 6.

The payback time for community solar will be about 12.5 years. If you move away from Clark County, you can sell or give your credits to someone else in the County. We'll need 600 community solar projects similar to the one they are currently developing in order to meet demand.
